December is a busy month. Full of Christmas parties, plans for travel to see loved ones or for them to come to us, shopping to do, and Christmas baking and preparations. It is a wonder we ever have time to stop! Into that busy-ness comes the season of Advent, a season permeated with waiting and watching for the coming of Christ.

I'm sure many of us struggle with waiting and watching. We don't want to sit around and watch - we'd rather hurry things up! If God isn't going to bring the kingdom in a timely manner, we're likely to try and bring it along ourselves! Even John the Baptist, in the gospel for the Second Sunday of Advent quotes the prophet Isaiah in such a way as to make us think that all we need to do to prepare the way of the Lord is to make the paths straight. So let's get straightening those paths!

What we are left with is trying to find some balance between waiting for the Lord and hastening the day until his coming.

This is our Advent challenge. No one can bring about the coming of Jesus except God. We wait. We wait with strength and hope. But we also hasten the day and prepare the way. We pray with expectation, we watch the world around us and see where we can add our light to the darkness, and we join our voices with those who have come before us as we say, "Maranatha: Come, Lord Jesus."
