Minister's Message



Something to Look Forward To

"¹¹ For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Jeremiah 29:11

One thing about having a really long and cold winter (including a record setting February) is that spring is something which we can look forward to with only greater delight. Even for the ardent skier, we know that energy consuming cold, confining challenges to mobility, and hassles for parking are not our future. The best is yet to come. And when those first days of warm sunshine arrive, even though the snow may still lie deep upon the ground, we feel the surge of anticipation and hope in every balmy ray, known only by those with something to look forward to.

One of the great gifts of C.S. Lewis in his "The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe" is the imaginary world, Narnia, where, first encountered, it is "always winter but never Christmas." A world in the thrall of the White Witch where there is no spring. But then, it happens. The Lion is on the march. The ice begins to melt. Still in the false security of perpetual winter, the White Witch curses a supposed thaw which

has bogged down her sledge. One of her minions studying the greening grass around a stuck runner declares: "This is no thaw; it's Spring!" For the inhabitants of Narnia, finally, something to look forward to.

What C.S. Lewis conceived as an imaginary world has settled upon the inhabitants of Western Europe and North America as our real world. We are caught in a social imaginary where it is always winter never Easter. Philosopher Charles Taylor has mapped this world in his massive work, *A Secular Age* (Cambridge: Harvard, 2007). He describes a flattened creation of twisted logic where people believe themselves standing alone before a blind, deaf, silent universe of random, accidental, and impersonal forces with no meaning except that which each makes for themselves. (We cannot live without meaning.) Maturity is claimed in choosing meaning but this claim has more in common with an adolescent rant than adulthood. Self-expression is the required virtue and choice the only value. There are some real achievements but, like a relentless winter, it is exhausting. Social media abounds but it is marked by an increase in alienation and depression. A trend away from funerals is echoed by a rise in complicated grief. Life and death lack a fullness in the absence of a horizon. Even Apple's Steve Jobs, a prophet of this age offering more fulfilment in technology than committed love, began to wonder if there might be something else as he approached death.

He needn't have wondered. Whatever the imagined silence of the universe, God is not. In Jesus Christ, God has spoken: Christ is risen! We have something to look forward to in every moment. Love has eternal meaning and justice eternal hope. All our winters have this Easter. The Lamb is on the march.

For anyone who has done any committee work, projects, events, rented or borrowed church space, planned a wedding or planned a final farewell for a loved one, you would have met and been graciously welcomed by Gail Teal, our Church Administrator. She is the heart and, dare I say, soul of Kingsway-Lambton United Church. Gail has been a part of our church family for over 45 years and a staff member for 30 years. She deserves every round of applause afforded her at every annual meeting and so very much more.

Gail was born into the Kingsway neighbourhood in August, 19xx, first living on Walford Road. Second child, second daughter for Gord and Mary Powrie, middle child between Mary Ann and Judith. Many of Gail's extended family – grandparents, aunts, uncles and cousins – lived within a stone's throw of her own family home. The Powries moved to North York for a time but the lure of The Kingsway brought them all back by the early 1970's and to membership at Kingsway-Lambton. Some dark days in Gail's life in the mid 1980's had her seek the advice of our then Senior Minister, Harry Denning. He saw all the good things in Gail and offered her a job at the church, replacing retiring Peggy Claringbold. Gail started working at Kingsway-Lambton in the financial office in 1985. Gail's previous career positions, cost accounting at Kodak and then legal secretary at Osler, Hoskin, Harcourt gave her a strong foundation for her job and for taking on her future role as Church Administrator in 1997.

The job and the location gave her so much more flexibility to continue her most cherished role, that of mother to Darryl, born in 1977.

Family is everything to Gail and she relishes beyond imagining her newest role, that of Grandmother to Aidan, now six months old, son of Darryl and his wife, Erin. She describes her Granny role as a treasured blessing in her life, a “dream come true” and is as caring, nurturing and supportive to Aidan as she has been as mother and mother-in-law. And even now most of Gail's family live no more than a few short kilometres from one another. Family gatherings are large and often. Gail's parents taught, by example, Gail's gifts of a loving and gentle spirit.

Gail's personal life at Kingsway-Lambton over the years has included the 20 Club, singing in the choir with her dad, teaching Sunday School, assisting with Outreach Galas, working at the Flea Market and The Close Knit-ters, along with being a presence at every church event. Husband, Ted Teal, sings in the choir now but Gail attends every Sunday to share worship with her church family.

Gail's duties at Kingsway-Lambton extend farther than any job description could adequately describe. She is our administrator in every way. She acts as a liaison with every committee within the church, manages the church accounting to audit, handles accounts payable, proofreads all printed material and eblasts going out to the congregation, controls and orders church supplies, acts as the contact person for any outside groups

or renters of church premises, handles the Stewards' committee minutes, acts as a liaison between the congregation and our ministerial staff. She handles everyone, even the most challenging, with prayer, patience, tact and graciousness. Her most important job, although not written in any manual, is that of pastoral care. So many folk enter Gail's office with a heavy burden to be greeted warmly and lovingly. Gail has never been too busy not to put her work aside and listen, comfort and care for someone whose need has brought them to her door. She cares deeply for this aspect of her life at Kingsway-Lambton, being a part of a church family and walking the journey with each member. Gail's day is done when the job is finished, most often long past the close of a normal working day. Thank you Gail! When you next see Gail, offer her a much deserved round of applause. ◆

2015 Operating Budget

The annual 2015 operating budget was approved at the Official Board meeting on Feb 3rd, and at the Annual Congregational meeting on Feb 23rd. As in prior years, it is based on 4 main policy objectives:

1. Compensate our staff competitively
2. Maximize the return on our investments
3. Maintain our building and facilities
4. Fund new programs to sustain and grow our membership base.

With regard to the last objective, funding new programs, we want to support the work of session and music, and the important work that they are doing in the area of membership engagement and growth. This includes several contemporary services that have been planned for 2015.

Other initiatives that have been undertaken and are in the budget include the hiring of Judith McCartney as our Interim Minister of Young Families, Children, and Youth, and a complete rebranding of our website.

The challenge is to achieve these objectives while being fiscally responsible. With that in mind, an operating budget has been approved that is calling for a deficit of \$15,000. This will be a very challenging number to achieve. Our revenue must continue to grow if we want to invest in those areas that will keep our Church strong and growing.

At this point in time, I can report that our numbers so far to the end of February are about where we want them to be. We will wait for the March results to come in, as the first quarter (January to March) is usually a good indicator as to how the year is likely to shape up.

Online Givings

A gentle reminder to the congregation that our on line giving initiative has been up and running for over a year now. You can find the links on our website www.kingswaylambton.ca. It is designed to let members of the congregation make a donation, even if they haven't been able to make it to Church for whatever reason. ♦

Update on AV Equipment in the Sanctuary

On November 2nd and 16th two contemporary services were held at Kingsway-Lambton. In order to allow people to experience fully the contemporary worship style, audio-visual equipment was rented for these services. A survey completed after the services provided positive feedback on the worship services and the use of technology. As approved by Session, the contemporary services are continuing on the first Sunday of the month until June, 2015.

To support the contemporary services, several steps have been taken to move forward with the installation of AV equipment in the sanctuary. In October 2014, the Official Board approved the formation of a Committee to revisit the installation of AV equipment.

Early in 2015, the Stewards and the Official Board approved the AV Project as being the top priority of all capital projects. A motion was presented and passed unanimously at the Congregational Meeting in February, 2015, to proceed with the project this year. The final concept will be presented to Session and the Committee of Stewards for approval before implementing the system. This Committee will be looking carefully at how we can add audio-visual equipment to the sanctuary in a way that will enhance the services without detracting from our beautiful sanctuary. The members of the AV Project Committee are Geoff Butler, Susan Culver, Dan Dupak, Priscilla Knight and Donna-Lee Waymann. ♦

Future Capital Projects at Kingsway-Lambton

The Stewards convened a Focus Group on January 10, 2015 to discuss future Capital projects in the Church.

A presentation was made to the Group on each of the potential Capital projects on our horizon. Questions were asked and answered, and the opportunity to express opinions was provided. At the end of the morning, all seventeen people present were asked to indicate their personal priorities going forward. The results were analyzed and a ranking of the projects was established.

1. AV project (2015)
2. Roof replacement (2016)
3. Air conditioning
4. Organ refurbishment
5. Manse Fund
6. Chancel enhancement

At their meeting on January 27th the Committee of Stewards accepted the recommendations relating to prioritizing the proposed future Capital Projects, and forwarded them to the Official Board, which also accepted them and referred them to the Annual Meeting. On February 22nd, 2015 the Members of the congregation also approved the prioritized list of projects.

The roof replacement was originally scheduled for 2015, but it was deferred for a year to allow for the installation of the new heating system. The present roof was installed 23 years ago and at our recent Christmas Eve service we experienced a leak in the Chapel area. We will be monitoring the situation closely to avoid any water damage to our property.

Over the next few years, we will be proceeding with the other projects on the list, as funds become available. The Gifts and Giving Committee is reviewing the list and hopes to be in a position to make a recommendation to the May meeting of the Official Board with respect to the formation of a Capital Campaign Committee to address the situation. ♦



My name is Margaret. I met you for the first time the week before Christmas. It was by accident ... but maybe it was meant to be.

My husband, Bruce, and I were in transit from Florida to Ottawa. Bruce took ill in-flight and on landing in Toronto, was rushed to Brampton Civic Hospital where he underwent emergency surgery for Necrotizing Fasciitis - flesh-eating disease. Despite a 30 cm-long incision, miraculously, his arm was saved.

I was stranded ... except for dear friends Barbara Sheffield and Peter Restivo who cared, nurtured and chauffeured me for nine days.

They also brought me to Kingsway-Lambton on December 21, a day I was meant to sing the Nine Lessons and Carols with my home church choir. Instead I was part of your service, which was a wonderful blending of my Methodist roots and my now-Anglican tradition.

It was an uplifting service ... a transition from Advent to Christmas. At the end of the service was Handel's beloved *Hallelujah Chorus* and I could join in. I don't think I've ever sung it with such gusto. It came alive. It was just what I needed to keep faith and hope going.

And then Hugh walked across the sanctuary, took my hand and said, "You must be Margaret. Tell Bruce we're praying for him."

Thank you, Hugh. That personal reaching out, and those simple words of faith meant the world to me at that time. I came alive - just like the *Hallelujah!* And I

came back for more support on Christmas Eve.

We eventually flew home Christmas day. Five days later Bruce had further surgery to close the wound with 43 staples. He has made a great recovery, and is back to normal with a 30 CM scar.

To Hugh and the people of Kingsway-Lambton, I was a stranger and you took me in. Thank you for your prayers and for being part of what started as a scary journey on an unknown path, but became a real Christmas gift, an amazing experience of love and caring, from friends and strangers, that we will treasure. We have been truly blessed.

Your web-page says ***We're so glad you've come. I'm glad I did. No one is ever alone. So true. Thank you.***
