Welcome to the Parish Church of St. John the Divine, Victoria. We are a community of faith in the Anglican Tradition, seeking to live lives of faith, hope and love as part of this community of Downtown Victoria. We are on a journey of learning to be a welcoming, inviting, inclusive and serving community which is open to all.

Our worship reflects our rootedness in the Anglican tradition, whilst drawing on liturgies that reflect the long history and heritage of our Christian faith. Please join in as you feel able, and enjoy the words, music and opportunity for prayer and to be a part of our community.

If our service seems unfamiliar, please follow the cues from our leaflet, the ministers leading the service and those around you. Most of our Sunday morning worship services have the Eucharist, or Holy Communion, at the heart of our worship – please feel free to join us, whatever your tradition, in the sharing of bread and wine. Gluten free wafers are available: Please indicate if you need one.

Within the Anglican Church of Canada (under the advice of the Primate and the Chief Medical Officer for Canada) we would ask that bread is not dipped into the wine, as this has the potential to spread infection in a way that the sharing of the cup does not. If you would prefer not to share the cup then receiving only bread is considered ‘full communion’ (also known as ‘Communion in One Kind’).

If there is anything that you wish to talk about, please do take the opportunity to talk to the worship leaders, ministers and other members of the congregation following the service. If you wish to receive prayer for yourself or for another, there will be members of our Healing Prayer group in the south Quadra entrance who would be happy to pray with you as the Holy Communion is shared.

After our service we usually share coffee and an opportunity to get to know one another, in the Church Hall – through the door on the front left hand side. We have many visitors and newcomers here so please make yourself known to folks as you feel comfortable.

You are very welcome here. We don’t always get it right; please let us know when we do, and when we don’t. Please stay and be a part of our family, for however long you would like.

THE BLESSING OF WATER

A short meditation may be sung by the choir or played by the organ.

Please turn to face the west end of the church.



longing for the bread of tomorrow and the wine of the age to come.


Therefore we proclaim our hope.

Any not receiving communion are invited to receive a blessing, and to indicate that by holding their arms crossed on their chest. If you are unable to come forward for communion please make this known to the Greeters and we will bring communion to you.

Gluten free wafers for communion are available. Please request them from the person who is distributing the bread.

MINISTRY OF HEALING

Immediately after receiving, go to the prayer station in the south Quadra entrance. Briefly state your need. The prayer team will lay hands on your shoulders and will pray quietly for you.

READINGS FOR MARCH 15TH – THE THIRD SUNDAY IN LENT

Exodus 17:1-7 The Israelites have escaped from Egypt and are now wandering in the desert. Earlier they grumbled that they had no food, so God gave them the gift of manna. Now they begin to grumble again. **Psalm 95** God's care for God's people is celebrated. **Romans 5:1-11** Paul has argued that it was Abraham's faith that led God to find him worthy, rather than his obedience to a law. Now Paul tells of the results of the justification that comes through faith in Christ. **John 4:5-42** Jesus has left Judea to return to Galilee. His route takes him through the land of the Samaritans, with whom the Jews never enjoyed good relations.

The five Sundays before Passion Sunday will have a Water Rite at the beginning of the Eucharist. The purpose of the Rite is to draw attention to the sacredness of water within our faith tradition. This also goes along with Bishop Logan's request that we study the book, *Watershed Discipleship*.

Water is considered a primordial element of creation. This means that it existed prior to the Creation Story found in the first chapter of Genesis. The other primordial element is wind. Scripture is rich with references to water. We know that water is essential for life and without water there is no life. The springs, streams, and rivers are the living waters that allow life to flourish. Water is a sign of God's blessing and to be near restful waters is a gift from God. And as one of the central actions of faith we know that Jesus was baptized in the River Jordan and from those baptismal waters flow our death to selfishness and our birth into God's love and healing. Jesus promises us living water. The New Jerusalem has the stream of living waters flowing through it. Lent is a great time to ponder the blessing of water.

Watershed Discipleship

Each week within Lent we will be hosting '**Lunch With a Point**' at **12noon on Wednesdays** for an hour and a half, and a discussion following the **Evening Eucharist at 5:30pm on Thursdays** (**Eucharist 5:30, Soup/Chili 6pm, Discussion 6:30-8:00pm**) – these discussions will be on the book 'Watershed Discipleship' which Bishop Logan has directed us to study over these weeks. If you plan to attend either session please let us know ahead of time. Here's a summary of the planned study so far.

Week 2

11/12 March – **Chapter 7 - A Pipeline Runs Through Naboth's Vineyard** (p.121) by *Matt Humphreys* – Matt is a local Anglican Cleric who places the story of Indigenous water protectors in BC in the context of the Bible story of Naboth having his vineyard stolen by King Ahab.

Week 3

18/19 March – **Chapter 1- The Great Commission** (p.25) by *Katerina Friesen* – A very personal story of considering the North American sense of 'rootlessness' in the light of one person's experience with the land and water protectors of the Philippines.

Week 4

25/26 March – **Chapter 10 - Bioregionalism and the Catholic Worker Movement** (p.158) by *Victoria Machado* – exploring the roots of the Catholic Worker movement for social justice, links with Dorothy Day, and considering what it means to be grounded in the place where we live.

Week 5

1/2 April - **Chapter 3 – The Transfigured Earth** (p.60) by *Jonathan McRay* – An exploration of how being rooted in the place we live, the place of the watershed, is the fullest expression of the phrase 'The Kingdom of God'.

Though it would be good to read the chapters before coming – if you're unable to, please come and join in the discussion anyway, it should be a good conversation!

REEL THOUGHT

Movie Night –

Wednesday evening this week, March 11th, at 7:00 pm Reel Thought will present our second screening for Lent 2020 in the Denson Lounge of St. John the Divine Anglican Church.

This Lent we are presenting five screen adaptations of the novels of E.M. Forster. As his second novel, *The Longest Journey*, has not yet been adapted for the screen, we continue with his third novel:

A Room with a View (UK; 1985; 117 mins.) <https://www.imdb.com/title/tt0091867/>

"When Lucy Honeychurch (Helena Bonham Carter) and chaperone Charlotte Bartlett (Dame Maggie Smith) find themselves in Florence with rooms without views, fellow guests Mr. Emerson (Denholm Elliott) and son George (Julian Sands) step in to remedy the situation. Meeting the Emersons could change Lucy's life forever, but once back in England, how will her experiences in Tuscany affect her marriage plans?" - *Written by Bridget Jones, IMDb*

A Room with a View was written three years after *Where Angels Fear to Tread*, and its major themes are so similar that it is as if Forster is trying to improve upon his first novel. This is arguably Forster's lightest, happiest and most accessible work, and this film captures this beautifully. It is the first of three Forster adaptations made by the Merchant-Ivory team, and it is wonderfully cast. Come and discover why Jesus and Forster – an avowed humanist – would probably (and may) have found a great deal to talk about.

Mark your calendars: Reel Thought for Lent is being presented weekly through the Wednesday before Holy Week, April 1st. This year's theme is "only connect," the driving force at the heart of E.M. Forster's six novels: his desire for his characters' parts to be connected and for his characters to be connected to each other. We are presenting the five novels that have been adapted for the screen, in the order in which they were written.
