







Spring Cleaning

... just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life.” - Romans 6:4



The blossoms are blossoming, leaves are leafing, bulbs are blooming...what are you up to these days? With Spring, new life surrounds us. With Easter, Eternal Life seeks us: the newness and quality of life that time cannot diminish nor the seasons alter. One way we can say yes to this life is by receiving the gift of forgiving.



In our adult study groups, we've been working through a deeply honest book called "A Time to Forgive." It's Darold Bigger's personal story of his journey from the senseless murder of his 25-year-old daughter to reclaiming his life through forgiving.

The Christian faith offers many gifts you will receive nowhere else and one of these and one often misunderstood is its gift of forgiving. I'm going to ruthlessly summarize the 13th chapter of Bigger's book, so you might be encouraged to receive that gift for you and those you love. Spring is a good time to clear out unnecessary baggage.

Bigger explains:

Forgiving **isn't** forgetting; **isn't** condoning; **isn't** excusing; **isn't** necessarily even reconciling.
Forgiving **is** facing reality; **is** confronting the wrong; **is** accepting consequences; **is** releasing anger and resentment.

Far from forgetting or condoning, to forgive requires that you recognize an injury has happened. Something or someone has hurt you and that remains wrong; forgiving doesn't change that nor disperse all the consequences. But forgiving does assert that the wrong doesn't have a right to shape the rest of your days, define your identity, nor be the object of your ongoing thoughts and feelings.

Sin doesn't deserve that and you deserve more.
Forgiving is a declaration of freedom and claiming the life and future love intends for you.

The story of Easter is the story of our living God who chose to forgive so that the divine agenda of love and life's flourishing would not be destroyed by humanity's choice of death. Jesus still bore the marks of the nails but in the risen Christ, our living God moves forward with the plan of love. We are forgiven and we are given the gift of forgiving because our future is more important than any evil that would try to steal it from us.

In a Nutshell: 1st Quarter 2017

As reported in the last issue of *The Carillon*, Kingsway-Lambton's annual 2017 operating budget was approved by the Official Board on February 7. Final approval was obtained by the congregation at the annual meeting on February 26.

Once the budget was approved, we broke down the numbers into monthly and quarterly targets for revenue and expenses. The operating budget approved for this year is calling for a deficit of \$21,000. This compares to a surplus of approximately \$20,000 that we achieved in 2016. As a result of these differences, we're predicting that we'll break even for two the years, 2016 and 2017, combined.

We want to protect as much as possible the various initiatives that have been, or will be started at Kingsway-Lambton. We also continue to seek increasing our membership base, and enhance our profile and relevancy throughout the Etobicoke community. As usual, this will be a very challenging budget but we believe that it's achievable.

So, how are we doing? The results to the end of March are about where we expected them to be. Having said that, it's early in the year and we still have nine months to go. We'll keep an eye on our progress and will ensure readers are updated along the way.



Every beautiful building requires some upkeep from time to time.

In the case of Kingsway-Lambton, there are several important projects underway to ensure the protection and longevity of our place of worship.

Busy Time in Property

Starting at the top (literally...) the shingles on the sloped roofs are currently being removed and replaced with Landmark Pro Fiberglass-asphalt shingles. And none too soon, for we have shingles literally flying off the roof with every wind storm! The maintenance team undertook temporary patching for several years in efforts to extend their life, but we can wait no longer.

Thanks to the generosity of our members during the current Capital Campaign, the roof will be paid for in full to the tune of \$100,000. The work began in early May and is expected to take about a month to complete. Of course, the schedule is dependent on cooperative weather.

In early June, we will commence the underpinning of the six buttresses which support the walls of our sanctuary. Once they have been secured, we will start to re-waterproof the foundation wall surfaces of the Auditorium. A new cold-applied water proofing system will also be applied and include a new drainage board on the surfaces of the foundation wall.

The underpinning represents new work and will therefore run a cost of \$7,000. Thankfully however, the waterproofing and sidewalk improvements are being performed under warranty by Romanelli Construction Company (RCC) at no cost to the church. When the work was done in 2004, it was not realized that the floor of the Auditorium had been lowered by almost three feet around 1941. This is a generous gesture by RCC and enforces my belief of the necessity of dealing with known reputable contractors.

Cyber Seniors: Stepping into Cyberspace

Connecting Generations in an Online World

Age should not limit accessibility to technology, or new ways of communicating with friends and family. This is the basis behind "Cyber Seniors," a new eight-week program hosted at Kingsway-Lambton.

This program connects seniors with youth mentors who help familiarize them with computers and build online skills including e-mail and social media programs. "You're never too old to learn something new," says John Capes, program participant and longtime member of Kingsway-Lambton. 80 Years of Growing in Gratitude

By now, you've probably heard that Kingsway-Lambton is celebrating its 80th anniversary this year. Perhaps, like me, you're wondering what our church was like 80 years ago. To find out, I spoke with someone who was there back then and has been ever since...Jean Gunn.

In 1931, Jean moved with her family to the Kingsway neighbourhood. Her father was part of the initial group who raised the funds to build Kingsway-Lambton. In 1931, the property was an empty lot at the corner of The Kingsway and Prince Edward. Jean remembers that one of the fundraising events was a garden party, which took place on the empty lot.

Before the church opened in the late 1930s, Jean recounts her days attending Sunday School classes at the old Lambton-Kingsway Public School.

When Kingsway-Lambton officially opened in 1937, her family began attending the new church. Among her many memories of those early days are all the women decked out in hats every Sunday.

On Communion Sundays, the Elders, who were all men in those days, wore morning suits. For those who aren't Downton Abbey fans, a morning suit is formal daytime attire (something like a tuxedo). Oh, how times have changed!

The original organ was on the other side of the chancel. It was paid for by a member of the congregation, who, when asked for a donation, generously offered to cover the entire cost.

Among other roles, John has also been a Session Representative for more than 30 funerals, and for a short time, Secretary of the Official Board.

"I feel it's important to contribute and give back," says John. "If you're going to keep the church foundation and Jesus at the center, you can't stand on the sidelines." And he has done anything but that!

In his early years, John's hobbies included boat rebuilding, model aircraft construction, golf, cooking and singing. These days, you can find John's smiling face at the front desk of Kingsway-Lambton where he welcomes visitors and fields incoming calls. He's one of several team members that manage weekday activity and help create a positive and inviting impression of the church and its ministry.

John is quick to point to Marg, his loving wife of 64 years, as a big supporter of his volunteer pursuits. She too, has given much for her church community including being a teacher for the Kingsway-Lambton primary class, a former President of the UCW, an actor in past Christmas pageants and Kingsway-Lambton Players. If that wasn't enough, she was also President of the Kingsway-Lambton Bazaar – an annual event which preceded our present day Flea Market.

Collecting Bras for 'Our Sisters' in Ghana

In the fall of 2016, Unit 7 of the United Church Women (UCW) became aware that many African women cannot afford undergarments. They quickly took up the cause and accumulated over 300 bras from members, their daughters and their friends. Even a few new items were donated from the local shop 'Simply Chic.'

The need for undergarments came up through casual conversation with a driver through Etobicoke Services for Seniors - a service that is supported by Kingsway-Lambton UCW.

The driver, Diana Awuah, is a mother of four boys and a proud Canadian who has been here for over 20 years. She comes from Badu in the Brong Ahafo region in Ghana. Her father is a school principal and an elder in the Apostles Continuation Church.

The bras have been packaged and are now in Diana's hands. She will be going home to visit her family in Badu this summer and will co-ordinate shipment to Accra where she will pick them up and drive the 200 miles to her village. She hopes to send us pictures of what she knows will be a joyous event in the village.

Diana has sent us a note expressing her deepest thanks to all who contributed and the effort she says we must have taken to make it such a success. Her final words were "May the Almighty God bless all of you and your families." It was our pleasure Diana.
