A First Reading: A READING FROM THE BOOK OF GENESIS

Jacob's Struggle During the Night

A Second Reading: FROM THE LETTER OF PAUL TO THE CHRISTIANS IN ROME

Can anything come between us and God?

I'm absolutely convinced that nothing—nothing living or dead, angelic or demonic, today or tomorrow, high or low, thinkable or unthinkable—absolutely *nothing* can get between us and God's love because of the way that Jesus our Teacher has embraced us.

9 ¹⁻⁵ At the same time, you need to know that I carry with me at all times a huge sorrow. It's an enormous pain deep within me, and I'm never free of it. I'm not exaggerating—Christ and the Holy Spirit are my witnesses.

It's my own people, the children of Israel . . . If there were any way I could be cursed by the Messiah so the rest of my people could be blessed by him, I'd do it in a minute.

They're my family. I grew up with them. We had everything going for us—family, glory, covenants, revelation, worship, promises, to say nothing of being the race that produced the Messiah, the Christ. Blessed be God, who is over everything, always. Oh, yes!

The Process, version 1.1, Andrew Twiddy, May 2020.

This version of the prayer Jesus gave us, traditionally known as the Lord's Prayer, is similar in intention to the meditations and prayers found in the *Supplement to the Book of Alternative Services* (the grey booklet) of the Anglican Church of Canada, page 81.

To help those who may wish to cross barriers of language and culture to find a new expression for this prayer, this translation, *The Process*, operates on the principle of dynamic-equivalence, based on a search for an intersection point between an evolving world of diversity and a sympathetic reading of ancient Middle Eastern texts and context, Semitic thought forms, and the Greek text of early Christian documents, as found in the Gospel of Matthew, chapter 6, and the Gospel of Luke, chapter 11.
