Notes	<p>Per CFC - The Crime Severity Index weights the severity of a crime by the rate of incarceration multiplied by the average incarceration period. The weights for each crime are multiplied by the volume of such crimes committed and the index is set such that the value is 100 in the year 2006. The crime rate consists of all Criminal Code offences excluding traffic. It also excludes drug offences and all federal statutes.</p> <p>At 42.7 in 2013, the Overall Crime Severity Index in Sunshine Coast (Rural) was 37.8 per cent below the national figure (68.7) and 52.1 per cent below the provincial figure (89.2). The level decreased 19.2 per cent from 52.9 in 2012 and decreased 75.6 per cent from 174.8 in 1998.</p>

Notes	<p>The 2012 Index includes the following qualifier from the Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General: "Crime Data are based on resident population and do not take into consideration non-resident or transient populations such as tourists or seasonal workers, and because of large demographic and geographic differences between regions the crime data cannot be used as an indicator of the relative safety of one region over another. It is the Provinces' [sic] view that all regions of BC are safe places to live and work.</p> <p>The Composite Ranking is based on the weighted average of the sub-indices.</p> <p>In 2012, the Serious violent crime data is based on reporting within the crime categories of homicide, attempted murder, sexual and non-sexual assault (level 2 and 3: resulting in bodily harm, wounding, disfiguring, maiming or endangering the life of someone) as well as robbery and abduction. In 2010, "serious violent crime" included all crimes involving a weapon as well as sexual assaults resulting in bodily harm, non-sexual assaults resulting in serious injury and abductions.</p>

Breaking & Entering is the only property crime included in the Serious Property crime rate. Property crimes exclude Motor Vehicle Theft and minor crimes such as bicycle theft and pickpocketing. Motor Vehicle Theft is shown separately.

Drug offences include possession and trafficking/importing/cultivation of illegal drugs excluding cannabis. Variations in the rates between regions may reflect differing police enforcement of drug possession between jurisdictions as well as differing levels of non-cannabis drug use.

The 2009 rates are based on average figures for 2006-2008 and the percentage change figures are based on a comparison of 2003-2005 to 2006-2008. The 2010 rates are based on average figures for 2007-2009 and the % change figures are based on the comparison of 2007-2009 to 2004-2006.

The 2012 rates are based on average figures for 2009 – 2011 unless otherwise specified. The Percentage change figures are based on a comparison of the average for 2009 – 2011 to 2006 – 2008.
