## Leaving Comfort Zones

*“Jesus prayed, ‘Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me; yet, not my will but yours be done.’ In his anguish he prayed more earnestly, and his sweat became like great drops of blood falling down on the ground.” Luke 22:42-44*

As we approach the end of Lent, we come to the most uncomfortable days in the Christian calendar. The stories of Gethsemane, trial, and Cross. Some people avoid coming to worship on Good Friday. The scenes brought to memory are upsetting. In a way, Christ is left to die alone again. We challenge, “What was God doing that made this necessary?”

It’s easier to stay in our comfort zones.

I’m preparing to leave on a sabbatical and excited for the opportunity. I’ve been accepted for a month-long program in Israel and a week on the rugged island of Iona, off the west coast of Scotland. But then I begin to think about the things I’m going to miss. The Clergy Golf Tournament, my annual trip to Princeton, my family, my routine, why, I just got Netflix! At this stage of my career, do I really need this? I’m not a world traveler. I travel in books. Better to crawl back into my well worn easy chair.

No. We’re never meant to stop growing. When Dr. Maria Varga spoke to us a few years ago, she talked about research with nematode worms. When put under stress, they live longer. Similarly, when we leave our comfort zones, whether it be to go on sabbatical or take on a Syrian refugee family, we have a chance to live deeper.



I’m not saying that’s why Jesus left his comfort zone. The one who is the author of life didn’t consent to facing our resistance in order to live longer. He persisted, faithfully and obediently, through the barriers of sin and death so we might live. The uncomfortable days of Easter can shock, wake us up, and turn us from the well trodden ruts of existence that lead to separation and death. They take us beyond our comfort zones so we might grow through the self-giving love of the living God.

Let’s be uncomfortable this Easter. Forgive someone who has trapped you in dark places of bitterness and retribution. Love someone with whom you love to pick a fight. Build a bridge rather than walk away. Together, let’s all walk with Jesus and see the price God is willing to pay to take us to a new place called Life.

Any word or phrase immediately preceded by the "#" symbol. When you click on a hashtag, you'll see other tweets containing the same keyword or topic.

### Mention

When mentioning someone in a tweet, use their @username, rather than their actual title. For instance, mention "@klambtonunited" rather than "Kingsway-Lambton United Church".

# Behind the UCW:

## Generating Funds & Delivering Value

Kingsway-Lambton's United Church Women (UCW) raises considerable funds each year through the annual Art Show, the Flea Market, funeral catering, and other fund-raising projects.

While most of the money raised is donated to a variety of charities, a contribution is made each year to the operating budget of Kingsway-Lambton United Church, itself a charity. "Our donation in 2015 was \$15,000, and we have committed to making another \$15,000 donation in 2016," notes Rita MacDonald, UCW President.

The UCW has also funded a variety of capital projects around the church including:

- ✓ \$12,000+ from the Flea Market to update the main kitchen, including new flooring, countertops, tabletops, and the purchase of a dishwasher (2013).
- ✓ \$100,000+ to the Open Access Project (2003-2006).
- ✓ \$20,000 to redecorate the West Reception Room (early 2000s).

Over the years, the UCW has generated funds for a variety of equipment (e.g. folding tables, tilt carts etc.) that are used not only at fundraising events, but for other functions that congregants enjoy throughout the year.

"The UCW and Flea Market Committee have been more than happy to put money towards these purchases and projects and we will continue to do so," says Rita. "Our goal is, and always has been, to work together to support our church while also reaching out to help those in need in our community."



# Dollars and Sense

### 2015 In Review

The results for 2015 were mixed. We missed our total revenue target by approximately \$26,000, mainly because our offerings did not achieve our target. On the flip side, our expenses were under budget by approximately \$35,000 because (1) We did not hire a second minister in 2015, and (2) a belt tightening policy was put in place across all departments.

Every department head and employee was challenged to cut back or eliminate expenditures wherever they could. The net result was a ~\$9,000 improvement compared to budget. We nevertheless ended the year with a \$7,000 deficit.

### 2016 Budget

In developing the budget for 2016, the Board had three policy objectives:

1. Implement approved actions from the December 16, 2015 Official Board meeting.
2. Re-allocate resources to better support our mission to increase our membership, thereby increasing our revenue.
3. Create a budget that was realistic, achievable, and measurable.

The 2016 budget was developed using a small, specialized group of eight people. They hammered out the details of what was felt to be an acceptable budget to present to the Stewards, the Official Board, and the Congregation. Part of the budget included a second minister which – we are happy to report – came in the form of Moses Kang (see p. 3 for his featured profile).

The challenge is to achieve our objectives while being fiscally responsible. The approved 2016 operating budget calls for a deficit of \$15,000. Several actions have been taken to match our expenses with our anticipated revenue. It is a challenging budget, but one we believe is achievable.

## New Friends in the Neighbourhood

Members of the Kingsway Community Refugees Welcome Committee (KCRW) attended Kingsway-Lambton's Annual General Meeting on February 28. KCRW is a neighbourhood group seeking Kingsway-Lambton's help with the government requirements to sponsor their own refugee family.

The congregation voted overwhelmingly to support them once an MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) is agreed to and signed by both sides. Kingsway-Lambton will help with oversight under the United Church of Canada guidelines -- the neighbourhood group will be responsible for all the funds and care required of their family. In short, this means we could be part of helping *two* families make a new life in Canada; one by doing our own project, and another by helping KCRW.



And we make new friends in the neighbourhood!



## Mom of High Flyer Gives Thanks

Many congregants know Barbara Jarvis in one capacity or another. For those that don't, she has a spark plug personality and the energy of someone 50 years her junior.

Barbara also has a son named Bruce - a decorated pilot of 20+ years who flies on international missions for the Canadian Air Force.

Bruce left for Kuwait on Canada Day where he performed over 30 fly-by-night surveillance missions. He returned to his loving family and friends this past Thanksgiving. "I want to thank all of my church friends, Rev. Dr. David Winsor and Rev. Hugh Reid for their prayers to bring him home safely during his latest tour," says Barbara.

Bruce and his team will soon receive General Campaign Stars which recognize the service of Canadian Force members abroad.

"In life, things change so quickly...you never know what might happen," Barbara says when asked whether she was ever scared that her son wanted to be a pilot. "That said," she adds, "I always wanted him to pursue his passion. We were always a family high on energy."

Flying runs in the Jarvis family. Barbara's father, Robert, helped build runways for Lancasters in England during WWII. He also flew hobby planes which no doubt influenced his grandson's future occupation.

## Refugee Sponsorship Update: We Think We Have a Family!

Joy Crysdale reports on the latest progress being made on Kingsway-Lambton's family sponsorship.

Our tri-church refugee committee had just met to determine how to speed up the process of getting a family, after difficulties with the process and availability of cases. It was the last week of February. We decided to apply for a private case, the kind with no government support. But we had no idea when we would next see a case list.

Then – bing! Twenty cases arrived by e-mail. Committee members gathered quickly and selected a case that fit our criteria:

A family, Syrian if possible, classified as “high urgency”. They live in Lebanon, and are originally from Damascus. Father 64, mother 56, daughter 26, son 20. Both children have completed some law school. All speak Arabic, Aramic and all speak English, except the mother. No health problems. Father worked in mechanics and construction. They are Christian and want to be in Toronto.

We will be thrilled to be their sponsors. There has been one hitch. We were told to apply by Feb. 29<sup>th</sup> and the family would arrive here in 2-6 months. We did that – but then were told the family's documents weren't available. So their arrival is now anticipated being six to eleven months from now. There have been many changes like this in this project, so we ask you to stay tuned to the church bulletin for the latest updates!



Tenebrae/Shadows Service at the church - celebrate Jesus' victory. Child care is available.


### EASTER DAY
