The Rector's Corner

At the summer Bible Study last Thursday night we read from St. Luke 1. 39-58. In this passage, the Scripture says that after the angel Gabriel appeared to Mary, she went to visit her cousin Elizabeth who was six months pregnant. When she entered the house something amazing happened – the babe in Elisabeth's womb leaped. Then the Bible says, "Elisabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit".

Here were two women – Elisabeth, well on in years, and previously unable to conceive a child; and Mary, the much younger cousin, espoused to Joseph but still a virgin. We are told that Elisabeth and her husband, Zacharias, were both righteous before God, "walking in all the commandments and ordinances of the Lord blameless" (St. Luke 1. 6). Mary was regarded in a similar way: when Gabriel the Archangel came to her, he said, "Hail, thou that art highly favoured, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women". (1.28)

So, here were these two holy women going about their work, committing their daily tasks to God in the life of prayer, as they awaited the coming of the promised Messiah. And then, totally unexpectedly, and certainly supernaturally, they both became pregnant – Elisabeth with John the Baptist, and Mary with JESUS. In their wombs they carried the forerunner of Christ and the Son of God!

As we considered this last Thursday night, one of the 'take-home' points for me was the importance of Christian fellowship. Interestingly, upon hearing the angel's message and accepting her role, Mary's first action was to go to Elisabeth's; and, as it was pointed out in our discussion, she stayed for three months!

In a sermon delivered at St. Paul's Cathedral in London, England, in August 1889, H. P. Liddon gave this helpful word of context: "Mary knew that she was to be the Mother of the Divine Messiah, when she traversed the land from Nazareth to a country house some few miles from Jerusalem, on a visit to her cousin Elisabeth, the future mother of John the Baptist. It was their meeting which was the immediate occasion of the Magnificat. Elisabeth had no sooner heard from the

lips of Mary the wonted salutation, of 'Peace be to thee!' with which the religious Jews greeted each other after a long absence, than, under the influence of the holy spirit of prophecy which filled her soul, she broke out into words which mark the high significance of Mary's destiny... "She spake with a loud voice, and said, 'Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb. And whence is this to me, that the Mother of my Lord should come to me?'"

There is so much that we could say about this passage, but a simple, life-changing point is the fellowship enjoyed by Elisabeth and Mary. Yes, they were cousins; but they were more than that – they were sisters of faith. The Prayer Book uses the phrase, "the family of God" to describe the Church (see page 552). It is true – no doubt about it – being together with someone whose heart is open to and desirous of God's Word and Way for their life is encouraging. I am helped and strengthened by other Christians.
