WHO WE ARE

St. Hilda's, situated on the unceded traditional territory of the shishálh First Nation, is a member of the Anglican Church of Canada and the worldwide Anglican Communion. As a community, we welcome and celebrate human diversity - including spirituality, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, and abilities. We aim to create a space where people of any faith or none can question and discover the sacred in life through openness, struggle, laughter and prayer, lived out through a common commitment to be in solidarity with the poor and marginalized, and to cherish Creation.

CHILDREN

Children play a central part when we gather to worship. We welcome them as they gather for a Children's Time at the beginning of the service and then send them off to Sunday School. They return in time for Communion—the Lord's supper (grape juice is available for communing). A Quiet Room is available for parents with babies and toddlers at the back of the Church.

HOLY COMMUNION

ALL are welcome to come forward and receive communion, the divine life of Jesus which comes to us in gifts of bread and wine. Come as you are. Instructions for people joining this meal for the first time are printed in the bulletin.

Worship this Morning


We are approaching a season of broken saints and redeemed sinners. Last Sunday we celebrated the Feast of St. Luke the Evangelist & Physician. Today we are celebrating our very first **Reformation Sunday** at St.Hilda's!

To honour the full communion between the Anglican Church of Canada (ACC) and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada (ELCIC), you are invited to the celebration of Reformation Day, an important festival of our Lutheran brothers and sisters. On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther wrote to Albrecht, Archbishop of Mainz and Magdeburg, protesting against the sale of indulgences. He enclosed in his letter a copy of his "Disputation of Martin Luther on the Power and Efficacy of Indulgences" which came to be known as The 95 Theses. The liturgical color of the day is red, which represents the Holy Spirit and the Martyrs of the Christian Church. Luther's hymn, *A Mighty Fortress is Our God*, is traditionally sung on this day.



The Anglican Church prides herself as being both catholic and reformed. This Sunday we shall join our Lutheran brothers and sisters to remember and celebrate our common heritage of our reformed tradition, our yearning for continual renewal through the proclamation of the Word of God. Our beloved parishioner, Pastor Richard Hergesheimer will be our preacher this Sunday.

November 1, the following Sunday will be **the Feast of All Saints**. There will be a time during both services to remember our loved ones who have died and are at rest in the Lord. **If you would want the names of your departed ones to be remembered. please put their names on the list on the sign up board** in the Narthex or phone the Parish Office.

Receiving Communion

If you know the brokenness of life, its fractures within and its division without, then you have participated in the broken body of Christ and you are invited to share in the breaking of bread.

The bread is received in the open palm. It is usual Anglican practice to drink the wine from the common cup. Wine and unfermented grape juice are served. If you would prefer to receive a gluten-free wafer or grape juice, please inform the person administering the bread or wine when they approach you. If you would prefer to receive a blessing instead of Communion, you are welcome to come forward and place your hands across your chest.
