A First Reading: A READING FROM THE BOOK OF ACTS

Reader: When we are all united in purpose, look what happens! A reading from the Book of Acts.

Now the whole group of those who believed were of one heart and soul, and no one claimed private ownership of any possessions, but everything they owned was held in common.

A Second Reading: FROM THE FIRST LETTER OF JOHN

Reader: “How do we live with clarity, simplicity, and joy ?” A reading from the first letter of John (...pause)

¹⁻² From the very first day, we were there, taking it all in—we heard it with our own ears, saw it with our own eyes, verified it with our own hands. The Word of Life appeared right before our eyes; we saw it happen! And now we’re telling you in most sober prose that what we witnessed was, incredibly, this: The infinite Life of God took shape before us.

³⁻⁴ We saw it, we heard it, and now we’re telling you so you can experience it along with us, this experience of communion with the Father and his Son, Jesus Christ. Our motive for writing is simply this: We want you to enjoy this, too. Your joy will double our joy!

⁵ This, in essence, is the message we heard from Christ and are passing on to you: God is light, pure light; there’s not a trace of darkness in God.

⁷ If we walk in the light, with God actually being the light, we also experience a shared life with one another, as the sacrificed blood of Jesus, God’s Son, purges all our sin.

⁸⁻¹⁰ If we claim that we’re free of sin, we’re only fooling ourselves. On the other hand, if we admit our sins—simply come clean about them—God won’t let us down; you can count on that.

2 ¹⁻² I write this, dear children, to guide you out of sin. But if anyone does sin, we have a Priest-Friend in the presence of the Father: Jesus, the true and just one, the Anointed One. When he served as a sacrifice for our sins, he solved the sin problem for good—not only ours, but the whole world’s.

1 JOHN 1 1-5, 7-9; 2.1-2, The Message, alt. A. Twiddy

The Gospel Reading:

Reader: Where do you go when you are afraid?
The holy gospel, according to John.

(All: Glory to you, Jesus, the Anointed One)

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the authorities, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you."

After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord.

Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained."

But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe."

Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Anointed One, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.
